## BELLAMY AWARD, 1961



In the fall of 1959, Berkeley High School became the nineteenth proud recipient of the Francis Bellamy Flag Award. Given in nemory of the author of our Pledge of Allegiance, the Bellamy Award is presented to one high school in the nation annually. California's schools will not come under consideration for another 48 years, but for several years to come, Berkeley High will send a representative to the school which is selected to receive the award.

In 1960 Vic Ichioka visited Cony High School, in Augusta, Maine, and this semester, it was my privilege to take part in the ceremonies at Topeka High School, Topeka, Kansas.

While in Kansas, it was my responsibility and great pleasure to act as a representative not only of Berkeley High, but also for the state of California. Before 3000 students and assembled guests, I was called upon to give a speech describing Berkeley High and the surrounding community. The speech was designed to make clear to them the many outstanding qualities which made our school worthy of being chosen out of all the schools in California to receive the award. I spoke specifically of our ideal location, the size and diversity of the student body, the fact that we publish a daily paper, the qualifications of our faculty, and the impressive achievements of our alumni.

Speaking personally, I cannot thank Berkeley High School enough for giving me this tremendous experience. Needless to say, I enjoyed myself, for the students and faculty of Topeka High School were wonderfully warm and friendly. I will never forget them, and especially the kindness of the family with whom I stayed.

The Bellamy Award Ceremony in Tokepa, Kansas was of national significance, as was demonstrated by letters of congratulations from Ex-President Eisenhower and President Kennedy. To be a part of such an event on behalf of the student body was a truly humbling experience and, to tell you the truth, slightly terrifying. I only hope that I have represented you well.

BERKELEY HIGH IN 1902
In 1880, Berkeley High School consisted of seven pupils in a room of a grammar school. Gradually it began to grow. and in 1882 a complete study course was adopted. The first graduation exercise was held in June. 1883, with one student graduating. Four students received diplomas in 1884. At that time Berkeley High was placed on the accredited list by the State University. It was the first high school in California to be placed on this accredited list.

The cornerstone for the first building. the Grove Street building (which was demolished in 1938). Was laid by the Grand Lodge of Masons on February 22. 1901. There were 500 students enrolled at Berkeley High School, but at that time it included the 9th. 10th. 11th. and 12th-year classes. Each year the enrollment grew, and by 1909 there were 1,250 students. The ninth-year classes were moved back to the Junior High Schools in 1910.

A school orchestra. two debating societies. the Pod. and the Senior Play started in 1892: a newspaper in 1912.

Even without the 9th grade, the school needed new buildings. In March, 1919. bonds to the amount of $\$ 429.000$ were voted for the purchase of additional grounds and erection of new buildings. The area that was purchased was within the boundaries of Grove Street. Milvia Street, Channing Way and Bancroft Way.

Today the school covers about 17 acres. with 12 buildings and has an enrollment of 3,200 students.
